


Mapping committee has determined the following priorities:

must first assess:

- **❖** Where are we now?
- Where would we like to be?
- How do we get there?



Where are we now?

Historic condition?

- Mapping often coarse scale or incomplete
- Historical records provide unique information
- Large areas of Spruce Forest were lost to logging and burning in the historic period
- Current modeling does not seem to be accurate enough for our needs

Where are we now?

- Current conditions?
 - Knowledge is limited and widely distributed
 - Better known on public lands, but, still not complete
- Restoration opportunities?
 - Limited to known locations with high visibility



Where would we like to be?

- Historic conditions
 - Central location for best available information on all lands within the SBR ecoregion
- Current conditions
 - Consistent and reasonably accurate knowledge of distribution on all lands
- Restoration opportunities
 - Agreement upon prioritization for site selection
 - Understanding of potential acreages within a 5-10 year timeframe.



How do we get there?

- Mapping current conditions through GIS based on aerial imagery and ground truthing
- 2. Development of restoration criteria and priorities
 - a. Based on best available historic information
 - b. And current management needs
- 3. Estimation of capacity needs for nursery space, volunteers, funding, etc.



How do we get there?

We need:

- agreement to proceed with a planning effort
- Commitment from mapping committee and others to serve as reviewer of preliminary mapping products
- Additional funding for the planning effort (grant proposals underway)
